Also, last time, we included invitations from HCAP and MOTAT via Mike, as follows:

On Monday, November 28, **ALL** NZSASI members are invited to an evening cocktail reception in Wellington. It will be held at the Wellington Club, stand by for the start time and dress code. This cocktail reception is put on by the Honourable Co. of Air Pilots (HCAP) to coincide with a week-long visit to NZ by the head of the organization from London. The NZ Chairperson, Capt. Allan Boyce, has kindly extended that invitation to all NZSASI members. This will be a good opportunity for pilots to meet safety investigators and vice versa.

For those of you in Auckland, please do not feel left out. On Wednesday, November 30, at the Museum of Transport & Technology (MOTAT), Captain Ian Sloan, retired from the UK Royal Navy, will be speaking about his flying experiences. In addition to flying the Sea Harrier, Capt. Sloan did an exchange with the French Navy and flew their aircraft from their aircraft carrier. The event starts at 1900 and everyone is welcome. The audience will be allowed to walk through the aircraft collection before the lecture begins.

#### And some more from Mike

I hope you are all doing well. As you probably know, I also volunteer for the guild of pilots (formally known as the Honourable Company of Air Pilots). The Chair of the NZ Region of Air Pilots, Captain Allan Boyce, has cordially invited all NZSASI members to attend the annual dinner. Please see the attached PDF document for more information. It will be on Thursday, December 1st in Auckland. Dress code is black tie and cost is \$120 per person. If anyone has been craving a fancy dinner and/or dressing up, then now is your chance! On a more serious note, this would be a good opportunity to make contacts to further our mutual goal of improving air safety. RSVPs are requested before November 15. Our next webinar is on Wednesday, November 9 at 10am. I'm proud to say Airbus will be our featured presenter. More specifically they will be talking about a product in their aircraft that analyzes the braking action on a contaminated runway and reports what it thinks the braking action should be rated as. This data can be used to support or disagree with the braking action reported by airport crews and pilots. Having landed on contaminated runways before that did not match the advertised braking action, I can personally say that I think this Airbus product is an excellent idea.

After that on Wednesday, December 14 our presenter will be Malcolm Brenner, an HF specialist who spent 25+ years at the USA's NTSB. If you attended the dinner at the recent ISASI 2022 in Brisbane, Malcolm spoke at the dinner about using voice recordings to determine a person's level of alcohol intoxication. Malcolm won't be giving the same speech to us as he gave at the dinner, but will confirm what his topic is going to be closer to presentation time.

Carrying on into 2023, I've got approximately 5 speakers/groups of speakers that have committed to presenting to us. I just haven't worked out which month is most convenient for them yet. Most are waiting to see how their 2023 schedules shape up. Once they pass that along I'll work on assigning them a month of their preference.

### Membership administration

Members can now edit their own details on the new(ish) website, https://isasi.wildapricot.org/;



This follows on from my recent email about unexpected messages from the site, and is also a reminder for those who have not yet logged in.

To log in, the Username is your email address, then click on the 'Forgot password' link. You will receive a random password by email almost immediately, and it can be edited at your leisure. Note that the email address needs to be the same as the one stored in the WA database, otherwise the system won't recognise you. If you do run into this problem, possibly because your email address was changed since your first joined ISASI, let me know, as I can look up (as a system administrator) the email address recorded in the system.

While logged in, please also check and acknowledge the Privacy Policy under the Contact Details tab.

Annual dues payment can be made through the WA system, and this (by credit card) is now the preferred method – the payment link will be quite obvious once you've opened your personal details page. The system will automatically generate an invoice and send it to your stored email address each year at 0001 hours 1 January Eastern Standard Time, give or take a minute or two. There will also be an earlier mailout once the system is rejigged after the recent glitch.

Dues for 2023 can be paid anytime from now – good idea to get in early!

Further to Wayne's plea, if you do edit your contact details, please also notify Wayne so that he can keep our local records current.

With the ripening of the Wild Apricot, the previous method of logging into the ISASI is now no longer valid (it was membership number and first name) as access has been aligned with the WA system, i.e., the password you set up with WA is common to both sites. Note that the home page of the WA site caters for new memberships only; upgrades and reinstatement forms are still on the ISASI site, under the Memberships tab.

Another reminder for those members getting near the current life membership threshold (currently age 70, with at least the preceding 5 years paid membership) be ready to get your application in, as the criteria will change on 1 January 2024 to age 74 and 10 years continuous membership – plus a fee (a big one!).
